### The Celebration of Holy Week and Pascha

A message from Fr. Thomas: I am sorry to deprive you of the rich and beautiful Holy Week services. The two most important events I could possibly think of in my family and parish are coinciding. I am doing my best to navigate this for the good of everyone involved. As of Palm Sunday, Presbytera Rebekah is happy and healthy. We are still anxiously awaiting the arrival of our second daughter.

"Man proposes and God disposes." I want to do my best to not miss BOTH Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. So, with Presbytera's encouragement, I am serving in Utica on Palm Sunday. I am not sure I will be able to return on Easter weekend. But, God knows how all these events will unfold. God willing, next year, Holy Week and Pascha, we will be able to observe the holy days properly, together, united in love for our Lord and for one another. I am immensely grateful for your patience during this unusual time!

# **Rectory Facilities Maintenance Project**

With the encouragement of Bishop Nicholas, Fr. Philip, and the Parish Advisory Council, throughout March, I met with various contractors to receive quotes for replacing the windows in the church rectory. The current windows are original to the building from 1962 and haven't been replaced. They are drafty, some are cracked, for some, the storm windows don't work and others are covered by plexi glass and can't be opened. The parish was also built without egresses in the bedrooms. This means that there is no easy way to escape in case of a fire. The parish heating bill is over \$1,200 each month in the middle of winter and almost \$8,000 per year. With permission from the Finance Council of the diocese and Bishop Nicholas, we are in process of signing a contract with Sure Seal Window Installations to replace 17 windows and 1 patio door, and to enlarge the openings of one of the windows in each bedroom. The cost is estimated to be \$37,500 and the project should be done by the end of June. The windows should pay for themselves over the next twenty years in saved heating costs, and even less time if the price of natural gas increases.

As administrator of the parish, I am responsible for meeting the spiritual and pastoral needs of the community, but also to serve as the steward of the physical property of St. Basil the Great. I think this is a much-needed maintenance for the long term health of the parish's infastructure. Window replacement in the church rectory will help preserve the physical security of the parish for many years to come!



# **Gospel Reading**

Matthew 28:1-20 <sup>1</sup>After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb. 2 There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. 3 His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow. 4 The guards were so afraid of him that they shook and became like dead men. <sup>5</sup> The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. 6 He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. 7 Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you." 8 So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. 9 Suddenly Jesus met them. "Greetings," he said. They came to him, clasped his feet

and worshiped him. <sup>10</sup> Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me." <sup>11</sup> While the women were on their way, some of the guards went into the city and reported to the chief priests everything that had happened. <sup>12</sup> When the chief priests had met with the elders and devised a plan, they gave the soldiers a large sum of money, <sup>13</sup> telling them, "You are to say, 'His disciples came during the night and stole him away while we were asleep.' <sup>14</sup> If this report gets to the governor, we will satisfy him and keep you out of trouble." <sup>15</sup> So the soldiers took the money and did as they were instructed. And this story has been widely circulated among the Jews to this very day. <sup>16</sup> Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. <sup>17</sup> When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. <sup>18</sup> Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. <sup>19</sup> Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup> and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

## The Paschal Homily of St. John Chrysostom

If any man be devout and love God, let him enjoy this fair and radiant triumphal feast.

If any man be a wise servant, let him rejoicing enter into the joy of his Lord.

If any have labored long in fasting, let him now receive his recompense.

If any have wrought from the first hour, let him today receive his just reward.

If any have come at the third hour, let him with thankfulness keep the feast.

If any have arrived at the sixth hour, let him have no misgivings; because he shall in no wise be deprived therefore.

If any have delayed until the ninth hour, let him draw near, fearing nothing.

If any have tarried even until the eleventh hour, let him, also, be not alarmed at his tardiness; for the Lord, who is jealous of his honor, will accept the last even as the first; he gives rest unto him who comes at the eleventh hour, even as unto him who has wrought from the first hour.



And he shows mercy upon the last, and cares for the first; and to the one he gives, and upon the other he bestows gifts.

And he both accepts the deeds, and welcomes the intention, and honors the acts and praises the offering. Wherefore, enter you all into the joy of your Lord; and receive your reward, both the first, and likewise the second.

You rich and poor together, hold high festival.

You sober and you heedless, honor the day.

Rejoice today, both you who have fasted and you who have disregarded the fast.

The table is full-laden; feast ye all sumptuously.

The calf is fatted; let no one go hungry away.

Enjoy ye all the feast of faith: Receive ye all the riches of loving-kindness.

Let no one bewail his poverty, for the universal kingdom has been revealed.

Let no one weep for his iniquities, for pardon has shown forth from the grave.

Let no one fear death, for the Savior's death has set us free.

He that was held prisoner of it has annihilated it. By descending into Hell, He made Hell captive.

He angered it when it tasted of His flesh. And Isaiah, foretelling this, did cry: Hell, said he, was angered, when it encountered Thee in the lower regions. It was angered, for it was abolished.

It was angered, for it was mocked.

It was angered, for it was slain.

It was angered, for it was overthrown.

It was angered, for it was fettered in chains.

It took a body, and met God face to face.

It took earth, and encountered Heaven.

It took that which was seen, and fell upon the unseen.

O Death, where is your sting? O Hell, where is your victory?

Christ is risen, and you are overthrown!

Christ is risen, and the demons are fallen!

Christ is risen, and the angels rejoice!

Christ is risen, and life reigns!

Christ is risen, and not one dead remains in the grave!

For Christ, being risen from the dead, is become the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. To Him be glory and dominion unto ages of ages. Amen.
